"Maryland Arts Day 2015" in Annapolis a Great Success!

Arts Alliance Joins Over 400 Statewide Arts Advocates





On February 10, members and friends of the Charles County Arts Alliance braved the frigid weather and trekked to Annapolis for Maryland Arts Day 2015. This is the annual statewide gathering of arts advocates showing their support for the Maryland State Arts Council (MSAC), an agency of the Maryland Department of Business and Economic Development (DBED).

Maryland Arts Day is presented each year by Maryland Citizens for the Arts (www.mdarts.org), in which we are a proud member. This year's keynote speaker was truly inspiring and amazing: Dr. Freeman Hrabowski, President of the University of Maryland, Baltimore County. Dr. Hrabowski spoke on the critical importance of the arts in education, in the human soul, and in human rights. He shared his own personal childhood story of joining Dr. Martin Luther King in Birmingham, Alabama, and the essential role music played in elevating his spirit while in jail. Dr. Hrabowski received a standing ovation from the attendees.

This year's event brought together over 400 arts advocates statewide to speak to our Maryland state legislators about our concerns over the Governor Hogan's proposed budgets for the MSAC. Specifically, the Governor proposed a 5% cut to the MSAC's current FY 2015 budget, and another 5% cut to next year's FY 2016 budget. Since the MSAC is the primary funding source for the county arts councils in Maryland (including us!), these proposed budget cuts are quite real, and if implemented, will be experienced directly by all 23 counties and Baltimore City.

President's Letter

Dear Members and Friends,

Well, we have most certainly enjoyed a "Winter Wonderland" the past few weeks, even though some folks just cannot wait until spring is sprung. Even during this frosty period, the CCAA has continued to move forward in its ongoing mission to serve the citizens of Charles County and to support and expand the arts in our region.

Earlier this month, we were very pleased that 11 CCAA Board members and friends attended Maryland Arts Day in Annapolis to encourage our elected officials to stand up and be counted in preventing a 5% cut to this year's, and next year's funding of the Maryland State Arts Council. They were able to reduce some of the expected cut this year, but the next year has not as yet been decided.

On a brighter note, Office Manager Judy Crawford and I recently made presentations to the Charles County Rotary Club (La Plata) and the Kiwanis Club of Waldorf. A presentation to the Waldorf Rotary was snowed-out (it will be rescheduled) and soon we will be with the La Plata Kiwanis Club. These presentations are designed to inform other community service organizations about the broad scope of our CCAA artistic activities, as we work to help people of all ages and cultural backgrounds.

Further, our Gallery Committee has already begun preparation for its Spring Art Show at the Waldorf West Library, and has some 40 visual artists signed up. Our Scholarship application time has come to end, and soon the Scholarship Committee will begin its selection deliberations.

RIGHT NOW! All of our members have the opportunity to self-nominate themselves for a position on the CCAA Board of Directors for the next two years. Many of our current Board Members will be nominating themselves to return and help continue our work, and a few will be moving onward with our thanks for their work. We would welcome additional individuals who are leaders and want to help us grow and expand over the next few years.

So please submit your self-nomination by March 15 (see page 4 of this newsletter for details).

Of course we still have our Spring Art Show to present, our CCAA Annual Membership Meeting to convene, Scholarships to award, and an ArtsFest to produce before the end of our year on June 30. You will hear more about these events in next month's newsletter.

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THE GOVERNOR'S P-20 LEADERSHIP COUNCIL TASK FORCE ON ARTS EDUCATION IN MARYLAND SCHOOLS

Co-Chairs: Mary Ann Mears and Dr. Jack Smith

OVERVIEW

The Governor's P-20 Leadership Council convened the Task Force on Arts Education in Maryland Schools in September 2013. Over the course of a year, the task force met to discuss potential recommendations on policy and regulation, curriculum and instruction, resource allocation, and professional development. The final report was unanimously approved by the P-20 Leadership Council in September 2014.

The task force report includes:

- · An Executive Summary of the need and the work of the task force
- A set of ten recommendations, including rationale statements
- Strategies indicating actions for accomplishing the recommendations with an accompanying timeline identifying responsible entities and schedule
- Research on the impact of the arts on student achievement, including a bibliography of pertinent research
- Analysis of public input on arts education gathered from online, essay responses, and statewide regional forums
- · Program data from schools and school system central offices

RECOMMENDATIONS

- A: Revise the Code of Maryland Regulations (COMAR) to provide specific direction to local school systems in the consistent implementation of comprehensive fine arts programs in dance, music, theatre, and visual arts for all children at all grade levels.
- B: Establish a comprehensive, statewide data system that collects elementary, middle, and high school data on fine arts instruction.
- C: Establish a minimum per pupil funding allocation required for and dedicated to comprehensive fine arts programs in dance, music, theatre, and the visual arts for all schools and for startup funding for new programs in those disciplines.
- D: Revise the Maryland State Standards for Fine Arts Education.
- E: Develop and/or align school system curriculum documents with the revised State Standards in Fine Arts.
- F: Provide central office leadership and support at the curriculum and instruction level so the fine arts have Maryland certified staff assigned supervisory responsibilities.

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- G: Staff all fine arts classes with Maryland fine arts teachers who have the depth of knowledge and skills necessary to teach the courses to which they have been assigned.
- H: Ensure that instructional time in all arts disciplines is not replaced or removed to facilitate additional time in another subject area.

I: Provide learning opportunities and resources for fine arts teachers to continue the development of skills needed to deliver a comprehensive fine arts program, for non-arts teachers to integrate the arts into their disciplines, and for leaders in school systems and in higher education to enhance their knowledge of effective arts education.

J: Strengthen the quality of fine arts teacher preparation programs.

All Maryland public school students have equitable access to arts education so that they can learn and achieve in and through dance, media arts, music, theatre, and visual arts.

MISSION

Increase student access to course in all art forms through purposeful actions.

- Promote and advocate for state, local, and national policies that strengthen arts education
- Communicate research and effective instructional practices in the arts with stakeholders in education, government, business, and the arts
- · Support and celebrate outstanding leaders in arts education
- Provide learning opportunities for teachers of all art forms, teachers who
 integrate the arts into their disciplines, and teaching artists
- Provide technical assistance in the areas of curriculum development, instruction, school structures, and organizational outreach to stakeholders.

AEMS staffed the task force and published the final report. The final report will be a powerful platform for AEMS to continue to advocate for and gain increased access to the arts for Maryland students.
